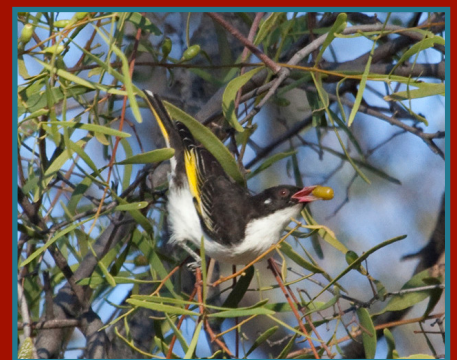
The most common comment at the end of the day was how beneficial it is to have experts like these in our local area.

## Did you know?

- Mistletoe has a reputation for burdening trees - however it is the main food source for the vulnerable-listed Painted Honeyeater (*Grantiella picta*), plus many other native birds.
- The movements and breeding of the rare Painted Honeyeater are influenced by the timing of the Mistletoe's berry production.

- Mistletoe only relies on the tree for moisture - contrary to popular belief, while still considered parasites, they rarely kill their host tree. These plants produce their own food, and have evolved with their host trees over many years.
